

Attendant Care Instructions

Under the Michigan No-Fault Act, injured persons may be entitled to attendant care services. Attendant Care Services are considered a medical expense. These services must qualify as being reasonable and necessary for your care, recovery and rehabilitation. You will need to discuss if these services are necessary with your treating physician.

These services have to do with your body; bathing, dressing, grooming, in and out of bed or chairs, up and down stairs, medications, etc. Anything you can picture a nurse doing.

These services are provided on an hourly basis. The hours per day depends on what your physician thinks is reasonable and necessary.

Attendant Care may be performed by anyone. The person providing these services need not be trained in the medical field.

These calendars should be completed monthly by your caregiver, and returned to our office at the end of the month or 1st day of the next month. Please also start in the correct box. If your accident was on the 13th, you will start in the 13th box of the calendar.

Each person that is doing the attendant care should complete their own calendar. The rate of the attendant care will be negotiated by your attorney.

Please use the letters in the boxes (do not write the complete description as the letter code is sufficient). Time frames are very important. Therefore, the care giver will insert the number of hours per day they are doing this care.

These services should be actual, legitimate services which you would have normally done and are no longer able to do on your own. If you have questions as to whether or not a particular service is compensable, or are in need of additional forms please contact our office.
